Three-year-old boy drowns at David Lloyd gym in Leeds

A three-year-old boy has drowned in a swimming pool at a gym in Leeds, West Yorkshire police said. Officers were called to the David Lloyd club at about 9.45am on Saturday, following a report that a child had drowned. He was taken to Leeds general infirmary where he was later pronounced dead.

Police said they were investigating the circumstances that led to his "drowning-related injuries", but the incident was being treated as an accident and they appealed for anyone who was in the pool at the time to contact them. DI James Entwistle said: "This appears to be a tragic accident and our thoughts are with the boy's family at this extremely difficult time." "While there is nothing to suggest that the death was suspicious, we do have a duty to investigate the circumstances of what has happened.

"We understand that there were a number of people in the pool at the time who have left the area prior to police arriving at the scene. We would ask these people to come forward to give their accounts of what they have seen and heard." The pool remained closed on Saturday afternoon.

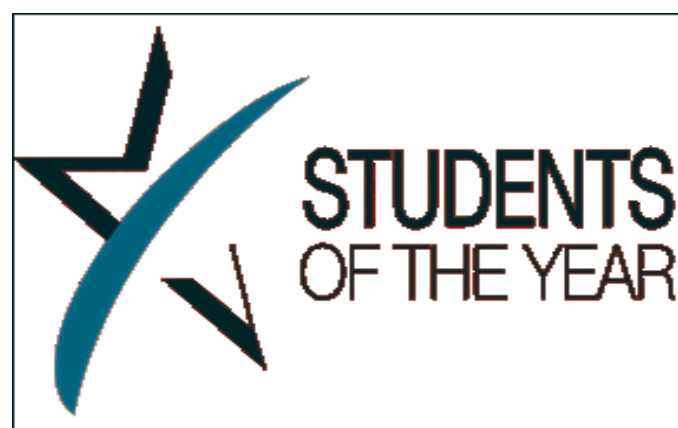

North Korea: can Trump succeed where so many others have failed?

Given that barely four months ago the threat of war loomed on the Korean peninsula, this is in equal parts a baffling and promising turn of events. Photograph: Jung Yeon-Je/AFP/Getty Images On the same day that the White House confirmed that secretary of state nominee Mike Pompeo met the North Korean leader, Kim Jong-un, South Korea suggested that its president, Moon Jae-in, would seek a peace treaty with North Korea when he meets Kim later the month. That would replace the armistice that has been in place on the peninsula since the end of the 1950-53 Korean war. Events are moving rapidly. Given that barely four months ago we were debating war on the Korean peninsula, this is in equal parts a baffling and promising turn of events. Baffling, because diplomacy rarely moves this fast, especially in east Asia. The Korean stalemate has been frozen for almost 70 years. Peninsular deterrence has been stable, despite regular tension. The ideological and strategic divisions between the US and South Korea, and North Korea, remain deep. Given that the summits are occurring just a few months after the initial proposals for talks, it would be astonishing if the US or South Korea were ready in such a short time. The South Korean side is likely to be better prepared. Moon has been thinking about

outreach to North Korea for most of his career. He has long sought a deal with the North, and he knows the issues well. But even Moon faces serious constraints. He only won the presidential election with 41% of the vote. That is nowhere near a mandate to turn cross-border relations upside-down or make massive concessions to North Korea. If Moon returns from his summit on 27 April with a deal full of South Korean give-backs and only vague commitments from North Korea, he will be pilloried in the conservative media, both here and in the west. Now Moon is talking about a peace treaty before even the denuclearisation issue is handled. This is unnecessarily accelerated. It would be a great achievement if Moon could simply move the ball forward on nukes alone. Even greater concern falls on the US side. Trump's participation is a huge wild card. It is now very obvious that Trump will come to the meeting grossly unprepared. He does not read and often dismisses his talking points. He skylarks and wanders, and his extraordinary ignorance of the issues means he may well make a concession without realising he has done so.



State media calls for Chinese citizens to stand up for phone makers ZTE and Huawei as backlash grows

After banning US companies from selling parts, software or services to mobile phone maker ZTE, US regulators said on Tuesday they would also bar government programs from buying from any company deemed a security threat. largest telecommunication companies. china responded on Wednesday that it has contingency plans for dealing with trade frictions. Yan Pengcheng, spokesman for the National Development and Reform Commission (NDRC), China's economic planning agency, said

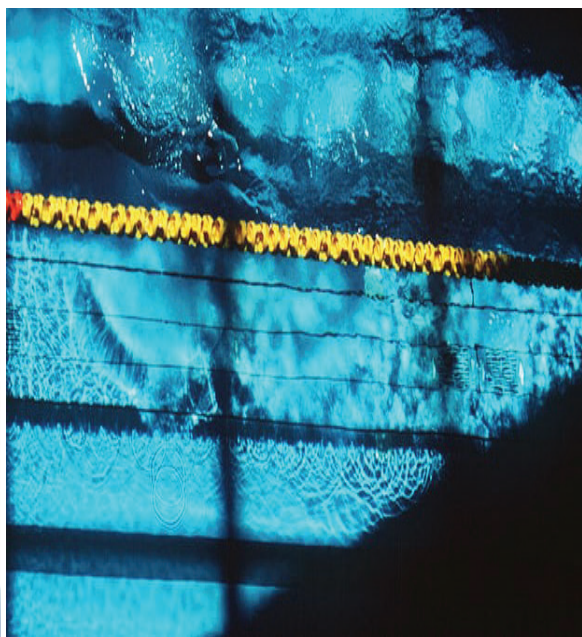


at a news conference that any impact on the Chinese economy from a trade dispute would be limited and manageable. The US commerce department this week imposed a seven-year-ban on selling products and services to ZTE. The department said ZTE

had violated an agreement to sanction personnel who sold sensitive US technology to Iran and North Korea. ZTE, which sources as much as 30% of its parts from the US, could be crippled by the ban.

Is it time for black women in America to take up arms?

For most American audiences, the female fighter exists in a land far, far away. To consider female militancy in this country, in our movements, requires a reckoning: the need to see police brutality against black women as state violence, checkpoints in school cafeterias as militarization, and the death rates from domestic and mass violence as mimicking those of a warzone. As the racial divide in the United States deepens, black women are increasingly taking up arms. According to data released by the Texas Department of Public Safety, black women are one of the fastest-growing demographic groups to obtain permits to carry a concealed weapon. Like combatant women elsewhere, these civilian women cite the necessity of carrying a gun – for protection and power. Legal scholar and activist Kimberlé Crenshaw is a critical voice in understanding this trend, and the driving forces behind it. Renowned for coining the term “intersectionality” over two decades ago, she’s steadfast in her focus

on the political impact a violent society, and state, has on black women, who are positioned at the intersection of multiple forms of oppression. Through the #sayhername and #breakingthesilence campaigns, Crenshaw has drawn the traumatic testimonies of black women into the mission of active movement-building and national debates on gender and violence. The legitimate use of violence as a form of resistance was as divisive a question in the civil rights era as it is in contemporary conversations on the value of black life. As the political landscape in America becomes increasingly militarized, women in the alt-right are armed, young white supremacists are armed, and, some hope, teachers may soon be armed. Where does this leave black women? . She is characteristically thoughtful – neither condoning nor condemning. Thinking back to the church massacre in Charleston, however, she wonders why nobody seems to be expressing outrage, acknowledging that black women are under siege
